About this Collection

This online presentation includes items selected from the Federal Theatre Project Collection at the Library of Congress. Featured here are stage and costume designs, photographs, posters, playbills, programs, and playscripts, including productions of *Macbeth* and *The Tragical History of Dr. Faustus* as staged by Orson Welles, and *Power*, a topical drama of the period. Selected administrative documents from the project are also available.

The Library of Congress received its collection of the records of the Federal Theatre Project by transfer and gift over the years 1939-46, with the largest segment transferred from the Washington office of the U.S. Work Projects Administration (WPA) in 1940. The collection was placed on loan at George Mason University by the Library in 1974, with additions in subsequent years through 1984. In 1994, the collection was returned to the Library of Congress and is now housed in the Library's Music Division.

The Federal Theatre Project Collection contains documentation for stage productions mounted by the Federal Theatre Project in the period 1935-39. These include a wide variety of materials: billboards, cast lists, correspondence, costume designs, ground plans, lighting cue sheets, lighting plots, music, photographs, playbills, playscripts and playscript "sides" (a "side" is an individual role or part), posters, production notebooks, programs, property lists, publicity reports and clippings, radio scripts, research

Introduction

The Library of Congress has digitized primary source materials from its collections documenting life in the United States from the beginning of the Great Depression (c.1929), through the New Deal period and economic recovery (c.1933-39), and the country's preparation for and entry into World War II (1939-1945).

This guide highlights collections of books, historical newspapers, images, interviews and recordings, among other formats documenting this period. It offers tips and strategies to find additional resources through searching the Library's digital collections more broadly by format. This guide also provides links to information on the Library's website related to key events from this time in U.S. history—the stock market crash and its economic reverberations throughout the country; the impact of the Dust Bowl on the economy and lives of rural communities; and, the federal government's response to these challenges. These responses included work relief in its many forms and the blossoming of cultural documentation projects, produced by the Work Projects Administration (WPA), the Farm Security Administration (FSA) and other New Deal agencies, in which the Library's holdings are particularly rich.

Since the 1990s, the Library of Congress has been providing access to its exhibitions online. While not full-fledged digital collections, these topical presentations include curated selections of both Library collection items and loaned items from other institutions.

- African-American Mosaic: WPA

In 1935 Roosevelt formed the Works Progress Administration (later renamed the Work Projects Administration—WPA) to create jobs that would allow individuals to maintain their sense of self-esteem. Even though inequities existed under the New Deal programs, they included ethnic and marginal groups, the financially and politically disenfranchised, the geographically dispersed, and women and children. In particular, many blacks found new employment opportunities, and special programs focused on three centuries of cultural accomplishments of African-Americans, as well as European contributions to national development.

• American Treasures of the Library of Congress: Depression Era

This exhibition includes the rarest, most interesting or significant items relating to America's past. Consisting of more than 250 items, this online exhibition is arranged in the manner of Thomas Jefferson's own library, the seed from which the present collections grew: Memory (History); Reason (Philosophy, including Law, Science and Geography); and Imagination (Fine Arts, including Architecture, Music, Literature and Sports).

• Bound for Glory: America in Color, 1939-1943

Presents color images taken by photographers of the Farm Security Administration/Office of War Information. The photographs document not only the subjects in the pictures but also the dawn of the era of color photography

• Coast to Coast: The Federal Theatre Project, 1935–1939

Explores a unique time in American history when the federal government organized and produced theater events in an effort to provide work for theater professionals who were out of work as a result of the Great Depression.
